This story explores the difficult themes of violence and bereavement.</p>	 <p>Dark Sky Park Philip Gross, illustrated by Jesse Hodgson (Otter-Barry Books) This collection of poems reaches deep into the past and wide across the world, burrowing into the earth and the sea to discover those creatures less observed. Jesse Hodgson's black and white illustrations complement the elemental voices while leaving plenty of room for the imagination to soar.</p>	 <p>Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver Wolf Brother is an exciting adventure set 6,000 years ago during the time of the hunter gatherers. Torak, of wolf clan is the main character. There are strong themes in this story, including bravery, loyalty and a deep respect for the forest and its inhabitants.</p>	 <p>The lost words – Robert Macfarlane & Jackie Morris This poetry anthology, published in 2017, is a joyful celebration in art and word-of nearby nature and its wonders.</p>

The stories cover themes of good and evil, the nature of heroism, taking responsibility for our actions within a classic voyage and return narrative.</p>	 <p>The Town is by the Sea – James Schwartz Themes of tradition, rhythm and duty permeate this book about a mining community by the sea. (2017) The light and shade of the ink and watercolour illustrations in this picture book perfectly evoke a mining community by the sea where a boy describes the daily life of his family.</p>
